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Section 1: Overview of Committee and 2012 Activities

The purpose of the Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Committee is to serve as a communication channel between City employees, the community, the City Manager, the City Council and the EEO Coordinator on equal employment opportunity concerns. The EEO Committee meets four times per year on the second Thursday of February, May, September, and November at 1:30 pm in the City Council Chambers. The EEO Committee consists of nine members. The City Council appoints two members of the public; the City Manager appoints one executive and three employee representatives; the service employees bargaining unit (SEIU Local 521) appoints one member; and the other bargaining units alternate appointing two members, one management and one non-management.

During 2012, the EEO Committee received and commented on reports about the city's training and employee development efforts, formed subcommittees to address specific initiatives, and continually reviewed the Goals and Objectives of the Committee. EEO Committee's activities for 2012 included presentations at the Quarterly Supervisor's/Manager's meetings, participation in the 2012 Access-2-Employment job fair held at the Cocoanut Grove, and finalization of the Proposition 209 Sub-Committee Report for City Council approval.

The Proposition 209 Subcommittee had the daunting task of updating all of the City's EEO-related documents to comply with current laws regarding EEO. As a result, several Administrative Procedure Orders, Council Policies, and a Resolution were revised or rescinded; please refer to the Report of the EEO Policy Review Subcommittee, contained in Section 4.3 of this Annual Report, for details.

In conclusion, the EEO Committee would like to thank the Human Resources Division of the Administrative Services Department for the administrative and logistical support they have provided.

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Section 3: Training & Employee Development

Dale Zevin, Human Resources Analyst/Training Manager

In order to comply with City requirements and State mandates, the City continues to provide Harassment Prevention and Cultural Diversity trainings to employees. Both of the above trainings are provided twice a year in classroom format, and Harassment Prevention training is also offered in webinar format.

Harassment Prevention Training

Employees who are new hires or have never met their initial Harassment Prevention Training requirements are provided with a three-hour 'live' classroom training presented by a Liebert Cassidy Whitmore attorney.

We also offer to employees (except for the groups mentioned above) online Harassment Prevention training by TargetSolutions as an alternative option to 'live' classroom training. Their two-hour online course, 'Sexual Harassment for Supervisors' meets the State mandate for a two-year refresher course for regular managers and supervisors and all other employees with ongoing supervisorial responsibilities. Their one-hour online course, 'Sexual Harassment,' is offered to temporary employees who do not have supervisorial responsibilities. The Human Resources Department also provides another option for seasonal Temporary employees in Parks & Recreation - a one-hour 'live' large group presentation training.

We continue our efforts to provide Harassment Prevention refresher training to non-supervisory employees who are temporarily working out of class as supervisors or managers.

Cultural Diversity Training

In 2012 the City provided Cultural Diversity Trainings on January 18 and May 16 presented by Wally Anderson, Consultant, United Behavioral Health (the City's Employee Assistance Program). Evaluation ratings and comments were excellent.

Employee Leadership and Development Program

The Employee Leadership and Development Program offers interested employees (new and incumbent supervisors and managers, and service employees who have expressed an interest in developing their leadership skills with an eye to being promoted) eight competency-based modules that strengthen participants' knowledge, skills, and abilities to more effectively perform in their current and/or future positions and be prepared for professional and/or leadership advancement to positions of greater responsibility. The Program serves as one component of the City's Succession Planning initiative. Almost all module presenters are City executive senior managers and department heads. Participants complete an evaluation form at the end of each session in order to provide data for improvement of future modules and the Program.

By the end of 2012, a total of 135 City employees had participated in the Program. Twenty participants completed all 8 classes, receiving a Certificate of Completion which may be used in lieu of actual supervisory experience when applying for some positions. The following modules were offered:

- March 16, 2012: "Communication Skills for Facilitating Effective Meetings" presented by Claire Laughlin, Cabrillo College Corporate Training.
- April 15, 2012: "Planning and Organizing Your Work" presented by Mary Arman, Public Works Operations Manager.
- April 25, 2012: "Decision-Making and Problem-Solving" presented by Mauro Garcia, Parks Superintendent and Grant Parker, Deputy Fire Marshall.
- July 19, 2012: "Customer Delight" presented by Mark Dettle, Public Works Director and Eric Aasen, Fire Division Chief and City Safety Officer.
- August 23, 2012: "Motivating Your Team" presented by Bill Kocher, Water Director and Steve Clark, Deputy Police Chief.
- September 27, 2012: "Performance Evaluation" presented by

Lisa Sullivan, Administrative Services Director, Teresa Landers, Director of Libraries, and Chris Stathis, Chief I.T. Officer.

- October 25, 2012: "Addressing Performance Concerns" presented by Joe McMullen, Chief Human Resources Officer and Wally Anderson, United Behavioral Health Consultant.
- November 15, 2012: "Project Management" presented by Karen Adams, I.T. Project Manager/Training Coordinator and Peter Koht, Economic Development Coordinator.

Mentoring Program

The City's Mentoring Program is another component of our Succession Planning initiative and provides a professional development opportunity for participating Mentors and Mentees. In the November 2011 – June 2012 round, 13 Mentors and Mentees participated in a 1:1 mentoring relationship. Matches were identified by the interdepartmental Succession Planning Advisory Committee and were based on Mentee's desired skills and competencies and Mentor self-described strengths.

The Program requires commitment and dedication from both parties who sign an Agreement and together develop the Mentee's 'Individual Development Plan' and goals based on the City's identified Leadership Competencies. All Mentors and Mentees complete Mid-Point and Final Questionnaires in order to improve future Mentoring Programs.

During 2012, one Mentee (Jason McCluskey) who is the Library Assistant-II/Person-In-Charge at the Felton Branch Library had the opportunity to intern in the City Manager's office for one year; the internship was in conjunction with his graduate studies in International Policy at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. Another Mentee received his PhD during his City mentorship. A third Mentee received a promotion within the City. Mentoring works and helps keep participants focused and motivated! Many of the participants continue their Mentee/Mentor relationships informally once the formal program ends.

Monterey Bay Employment Relations Consortium (ERC) workshops presented by Liebert Cassidy Whitmore attorneys

The City is a member of the ERC which annually provides up to ten different workshops chosen by its members. All employees of the member Agencies are eligible to attend free of charge.

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Report of the Website Sub-Committee

At its November 15, 2012 meeting, the EEO Committee established an ongoing/rotating ad hoc Website Subcommittee. The idea is to keep the website under regular review for any changes thought to be needed, and how to communicate them. The goal is to evaluate the existing presence of the Committee on both the City's public internet and internal Employee intranet sites and make recommendations for enhancements.

Subcommittee members will work with HR Staff Jacqueline Trumbull who will implement the recommended changes and keep the EEO section of the sites current going forward.

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Report of the Annual Access to Employment Job Fair Representative Deborah Holmes

The City of Santa Cruz supports the annual Access to Employment Job Fair with a representative from the EEO Committee or HR Department (http://www.access2employment.com/). The representative participates in the planning of the event. This was my first year representing the City of Santa Cruz. My husband Roy worked the Job Fair with me, and stayed all day. The City of Santa Cruz had a booth and the booth was staffed by Human Resources Analyst Lori Fukuda.

The first planning meeting was held Wednesday April 11, 2012. New members were welcomed and introduced. A historical overview of the Job Fair committee and services the Fair has provided over the past 20 years was provided. There were committee members who had served almost 20 years. People are committed to the Job Fair.

Hosting the Job Fair would be contingent on employer interest and affordability. A number of ideas were discussed from obtaining sponsors, free Job Fair for employers, changing event time, location and date. Finally it was agreed the Job Fair would be held October 9, 2012 at the Cocoanut Grove. The fee for an employer/agency booth was \$100.00 – the Fair was free for job seekers. There were 20 businesses and 18 government agencies and community organizations that provided information about their work in the community, and more than 900 job seekers. Committee members will review the survey from the Job Fair to help improve it for next year.

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Report of the EEO Policy Review Subcommittee

To update all City Equal Employment Opportunity-related documents to meet Proposition 209 standards an ad-hoc subcommittee (Proposition 209 Subcommittee) was established in May 2011. The subcommittee met six times before disbanding in November of 2011.

In the course of reviewing the target materials it was discovered that many documents prescribing EEO policies and related procedures were not only out of compliance with the Proposition 209 but also contained redundancies, contradictions, and outdated language. To continue the work of reviewing the documents, and bringing them up to date, a new ad-hoc subcommittee was formed at the November 17, 2011 meeting consisting of the same Committee members that had staffed the previous sub-committee: Chair Waldren, Vice-Chair Harmon, Member Walton, Member McMahon and staff McMullen.

The subcommittee performed a line-by-line review of each document and determined that consolidating all EEO policies and procedures into a Council Policy and an Administrative Procedure Order would greatly simplify the process of accessing and maintaining the information contained in them. The complete set of EEO-related documents with proposed revisions was taken to the City Council at their July 24, 2012 meeting where the Council approved the recommended changes.

- Administrative Procedure Order II-I (Affirmative Action Program) Delete
- Administrative Procedure Order II-Ia (*Discrimination/Harassment Policy and Complaint Procedure*) Revise
- Administrative Procedure Order II-9 (*Grievance Procedures for Unrepresented Employees*) Revise
- Administrative Procedure Order II-31 (Managing Employees With Life-Threatening Illnesses) Revise
- Administrative Procedure Order I-66 (*Employee Disability Discrimination Policy*) Delete
- Memoranda of Understanding Update during contract negotiations or by side letter

The subcommittee disbanded in May 2012 tasking the full EEO Committee to monitor the progress of implementing the changes and posting the updated documents for employee/public access and information.
